Welcome

This booklet aims to give teachers and schools an introduction to The Red House, Aldeburgh, home to one of the UK's greatest 20th century composers – and Suffolk local – Benjamin Britten (1913-1976) and his partner, the singer Peter Pears (1910-1986).

Britten Pears Arts manages the site and welcomes schools to visit and explore the wonderful gardens and historic house.

This pack includes information about **Music Through Time- Roman** school session, its curriculum links and details on how to book.

Benjamin Britten

Benjamin Britten was a composer born in Lowestoft, Suffolk in 1913. Many composers in the last century wrote music that was very complicated to listen to and required many highly skilled musicians to play and sing it. Benjamin Britten wrote music for everyone. He wanted his 'music to be of use to people, to please them, to enhance their lives.' People enjoy his music so much that he is now the most performed British composer in the world.

He wrote music of all kinds and travelled all round the world performing it as a pianist and conductor.

He was so famous that the BBC devoted a whole programme to him for his fiftieth birthday and he was the first musician in history to be made a Lord by the Queen. When he died in 1976, he left behind over 1,000 pieces of extraordinary music and the fascinating story of a journey from Suffolk schoolboy to great composer.

The Red House, Aldeburgh

The Red House is where Britten and Pears lived for nearly two decades from 1957. It has been carefully resented as it was back then. Your children will step back in time into a house which feels as though Britten and Pears have just stepped out for a moment.

The Composition studio is where Britten wrote many of his famous works. His desk, piano and other original items can be found in this room. It was a former hayloft and it was created in 1958.

The Library was built on the site of a disused barn in 1963. The room held Britten and Pears' large book and music collection and also functioned as a rehearsal space.

The Exhibition Gallery was built in the 1990s over Britten's open-air swimming pool, which is still beneath the floor. The Gallery now displays the amazing collections at The Red House to introduce Britten and his music. There is an audio guide to accompany the exhibition, a dress up area for children and an interactive screen.

Britten entertained guests, grew vegetables, and even played croquet and tennis in his beautiful gardens. Over 5 acres of garden is available for your children to eat lunch and stretch their legs.

Following your enquiry you will be sent a booking form. Please check the confirmed date and number of children expected and return.

Confirmation will be sent on receipt of the completed booking form.

Please arrange adequate adult support for your groups as the day works best when exploring in smaller, adult-led groups.

Preparation before your visit

Once a booking is made, you are welcome to a free pre-visit tour for teachers.

All Suffolk schools who book a session at The Red House can receive a free introductory visit to your school from our learning team 1-2 weeks before your visit. Please contact us for further information.

Please feel free to bring your own pencils and/or sketch books for drawing.

If you are bringing clipboards please bring a soft type or turn them upside down to avoid scratching display cases. Alternatively you could use sketchbooks.

There is a lot to see and discover at The Red House so leave as much time as possible and arrange plenty of adult help. On the day please aim to arrive at least 15 minutes before your start time (10.00am).

This will give you time for your lead teacher to sign in and any children to visit the toilets in the main reception area. If you can call us (01728 451700) approx. 10 minutes before you arrive, this is really useful.

We are aware that traffic can cause problems and we will do all we can to make up time if you have been delayed in any way.

Children's coats and bags will be left in our education room (the Imogen Hoist Room). Please keep bags with you until a member of staff shows you to the allocated area.

The main toilet block is situated in the reception area. There is also one toilet outside the education room.

Once your lead teacher has signed in please line up outside the education room and our staff will find you to begin your session.

In School option

The **Music Through Time- Anglo-Saxon and Viking** session can also be delivered at your school.

This will be a half day (morning or afternoon) session and will have a cost of £50 for all schools.

Music through Time- The Romans

Suitable for KS1 & KS2

Available as a whole day session at The Red House, Aldeburgh or a half-day session delivered at your school.

Approx. 30 children (contact for questions on numbers)

Explore the magic of music and innovation in Roman Britain.

Music and the art of making music is part of what makes us human. Every culture makes music, and every past culture has made music too. Roman rule effected all areas of life in Britain and introduced a huge variety of ideas, ways of life and objects. The Romans also introduced their own musical influences on Britain which even included a water powered organ!

This unique daylong session will explore the importance of music, art, and storytelling to the Romans. This will be through examining period specific musical instruments and handling collections from the Roman period.

A practical handling session will allow children to study Roman artifacts and explore what The Romans introduced to Britain. Children will have the opportunity to explore and play period specific musical instruments and have the chance to create their own musical Roman artefact.

The children will move forward to the 20th century to explore the life, work and inspiration of Benjamin Britten. By discovering the site where Benjamin Britten lived and worked children will understand what inspired his music and how he also used music to help tell a story.

The day will culminate with the children creating their own Roman musical performance.

This is a unique and exciting day combining history, music, and literacy.

Session outline- The Red House Session

The Day

This school session caters for up to 30 children and runs from 10.30-2.30pm. Please contact Joe Carr if you have slight variation in numbers. We will be happy to work to accommodate you. In preparing for this session all Suffolk Schools are eligible for a free pre-visit to your school by our education team.

Children will learn how to handle, examine and explore Roman artefacts to learn about the past, as well as exploring period specific musical instruments. Children will also learn about Benjamin Britten and have the chance to explore his house, gardens and studio.

This session is a unique opportunity for pupils to engage with history, object handling, problem solving, literacy and art and design, through exciting hands-on learning.

The children will need to split into 2 groups for the main parts of the day.

Session outline- In School Session

The Day

The in-school session caters for one class and runs either in the morning or afternoon, timings can be adjusted depending on your schools start, lunch and finish times.

Children will explore the history Roman Britain and will have the opportunity to handle some Roman artefacts. They will move on to explore musical instruments from the period before they create their own instrument craft, and perform a musical finale.

Children will also learn about Benjamin Britten and how his music was inspired by nature and his surroundings.

This session is a unique opportunity for pupils to handle artefacts, engage with history and music within your school.

Health and Safety
